If you are on campus and there is something you need, whether that is to stand up, remain seated, or take a break from the worship space for a moment, we hope you will take care of yourself.

Worship is at the heart of the Christian life. It is in worship that we express our theology and define our identity. We encounter God within worship and are formed and transformed as the people of God. Liturgy literally is "the work of the people," and refers to the patterns, forms, words, and actions through which public worship is conducted. Sometimes it may seem that the way to "do church" is inflexible... but the fact is, we have been finding our way in building community ever since the church was first born. We are gathered together, receive the Word of God in its variety, give great thanks (the meaning of Eucharist), and are sent to be living, active images of divine love. We hope you will be gentle with yourself and gracious with others as you decide how to be present. This gathering wouldn't be complete without each person who joins here, and we're glad you are here.

We are committed to the work of racial equity, justice, and advocating for marginalized groups. We welcome people in all places on the journey of faith and life. We celebrate differences in age, appearance, economic status, ethnic origin, nationality, race, family configuration, marital or relationship status, political leaning, religious background, and those who are differently abled physically or mentally. The Holy Spirit gathers us into community.

The church season after the 50 days of Eastertide and Pentecost Day celebrations is half of the year, yet it has no "official" name. It is called "Time after Pentecost" or "Ordinary Time" because of the numbering (ordinals) of the Sundays. It includes the distinct natural seasons of summer and fall, which have different themes emphasized. The primary color is green. This highlights the first part of Ordinary Time with themes of growth and celebration in community, and the renewal of faith and discipleship in the ministry and teaching of Jesus.

Gathering Music

A diversity of music is an important part of our witness, including the outstanding acoustics of our nave. As we grow our music ministry, we embark on a significant restoration campaign for our valued and aged pipe organ.

As you pass the baptismal font at any time you may dip your hand in the water and make the sign of the cross. This ancient body prayer reminds us of baptism into the risen Christ. You may touch your hand to your forehead, then to your chest, \pm then from one shoulder to the other shoulder.

Land & Water Acknowledgement

We acknowledge the presence of God's people living on this land long before European conquest. These lands and waters have sustained the Coahuiltecan, Comanche, Jumanos, Lipan Apache, Sana, Tonkawa, and other indigenous peoples for thousands of years. Gathering today to worship on ancestral homelands, we acknowledge and honor our indigenous sisters, siblings, and brothers who continue to care for the land and water and call this land home.

The ELCA's Truth & Healing Movement increases understanding of our impacts on Indigenous people in the past and present. Knowing and embracing the truth brings healing for all of us.





Thanksgiving at the Table

Most holy God, we bless you, for in a labor of love, you created the earth and the first humans tended the shimmering beauty of the primordial garden.

You heard the cry of the Israelites as they toiled under harsh labor and liberated them from oppression and slavery. In the wilderness you sustained them with daily bread from heaven.

You provided them a double portion on the sixth day, so they could rest on the seventh. In fierce loyalty and love, Ruth followed Naomi and labored in the fields of Bethlehem and was graciously grafted into the history of your people.

At the right time, you gave us your dear Son, our brother Jesus, a humble carpenter, who at the wedding in Cana transformed water into wine, and revealed signs of your glory first to the hired hands.

He abundantly provided bread for the hungry multitudes and taught that even the most undesired laborer hired last would receive a just wage to feed a family.

This bread, the vessel of your holy body, was nourished and formed by the hands of those who labor in fields. This wine, the flowing channel of your precious blood, was gently nurtured by the care of workers.

Even with these most gracious signs, we approach your altar with reserve, afraid of your glory, undone by our sin, fearful of scarcity.

In the night in which he was betrayed, our Lord Jesus took bread, and gave thanks; broke it, and gave it to his disciples, saying: Take and eat; this is my body, given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me.

Again, after supper, he took the cup, gave thanks, and gave it for all to drink, saying: This cup is the new covenant in my blood, shed for you and for all people for the forgiveness of sin. Do this for the remembrance of me.

Let us proclaim the mystery of faith: Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

We give you thanks, most holy God, for this bread and wine of your abundance, as it grafts us into the life, death, and resurrection of Christ.

Pour your Holy Spirit on these gifts, that our bodily and material needs are met with dignity and justice. Awaken our communities, nation, and the world to the signs of your gracious presence, that all find your healing love.

Most holy God, thank you for your generosity, for you are steadfast in loving-kindness, fierce to provide the needs of the poor, merciful beyond all knowing, \pm and you live and reign in love, in the church and in the world, now and forever. **Amen.**


