Worship is at the heart of the Christian life. It is in worship that we express our theology and define our identity. We encounter God within worship and are formed and transformed as the people of God. Liturgy literally is "the work of the people," and refers to the patterns, forms, words, and actions through which public worship is conducted. Sometimes it may seem that the way to "do church" is inflexible... but the fact is, we have been finding our way in building community ever since the church was first born. We are gathered together, receive the Word of God in its variety, give great thanks (the meaning of Eucharist), and are sent to be living, active images of divine love. We hope you will be gentle with yourself and gracious with others as you decide how to be present. This gathering wouldn't be complete without each person who joins here, and we're glad you are here.

We are committed to the work of racial equity, justice, and advocating for marginalized groups. We welcome people in all places on the journey of faith and life. The Feast of All Saints'

The Holy Spirit gathers us into community.

Today we commemorate a three-fold feast in one. All Hallows Eve, All Saints Day, and All Souls Day (Oct. 31, Nov. 1, Nov. 2) serve as a call to God's people to remember all who have died, and all who are alive in God's love. The gift of All Saints' Sunday is that all our sorrows become bearable as we - together - recall the stories of those who have died and how their stories point to the greater story of God's enduring and inseparable love with all creation and humanity. On All Saints Day, we read aloud the names of loved ones who have died in the last year. We call them saints, not because they were perfect, rather because they were loved by us and by God. We acknowledge that all people, being simultaneously sinners and saints, lead complex lives full joy and sorrow. We are confident in the sure promise that at the end of our life, God has welcomed our loved ones to their eternal home. This year's All Saints readings have the most tears. Isaiah and Revelation look forward to the day when God will wipe away all tears; in John's gospel, Jesus weeps along with Mary and all the gathered mourners before he demonstrates his power over death.

A diversity of music is an important part of our witness, including the outstanding acoustics of our nave. As we grow our music ministry, we embark on a significant restoration campaign for our valued and aged pipe organ.

As you pass the baptismal font at any time you may dip your hand in the water and make the sign of the cross. This ancient body prayer reminds us of baptism into the risen Christ. You may touch your hand to your forehead, then to your chest, + then from one shoulder to the other shoulder.

Land & Water Acknowledgement

We acknowledge the presence of God's people living on this land long before European conquest. These lands and waters have sustained the Coahuiltecan, Comanche, Jumanos, Lipan Apache, Sana, Tonkawa, and other indigenous peoples for thousands of years. Gathering today to worship on ancestral homelands, we acknowledge and honor our indigenous sisters, siblings, and brothers who continue to care for the land and water and call this land home.

The ELCA's Truth & Healing Movement increases understanding of our impacts on Indigenous people in the past and present. Knowing and embracing the truth brings healing for all of us.

They said to him, "Lord, come and see." 35 Jesus began to weep. 36 So the Jews said, "See how he loved him!" 37 But some of them said, "Could not he who opened the eyes of the blind man have kept this man from dying?" ³⁸ Then Jesus, again greatly disturbed, came to the tomb. It was a cave, and a stone was lying against it. ³⁹ Jesus said, "Take away the stone." Martha, the sister of the dead man, said to him, "Lord, already there is a stench because he has been dead four days." 40 Jesus said to her, "Did I not tell you that if you believed, you would see the glory of God?" ⁴¹ So they took away the stone. And Jesus looked upward and said, "Father, I thank you for having heard me. 42 I knew that you always hear me, but I have said this for the sake of the crowd standing here, so that they may believe that you sent me." ⁴³ When he had said this, he cried with a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out!" ⁴⁴ The dead man came out, his hands and feet bound with strips of cloth, and his face wrapped in a cloth. Jesus said to them, "Unbind him, and let him go."

Remembrance and Thanksgiving

The Altar of Remembrance will remain in the Chapel through November.

"Panis Angelicus" (which translates as 'Bread of Angels') is a verse from the hymn 'Sacris solemniis', which was written by Saint Thomas Aquinas for the Feast of Corpus Christi in the 13th century. The verse – also referred to as a 'strophe' – later became famous in its own right, and has often been set to music separately. César Franck composed a beautiful Mass (Messe à trois voix) dating from 1861 that incorporates 'Panis Angelicus'.

Apostles' Creed

We are united across generations, across centuries, across oceans, and across all that divides the human community. Let us affirm together our baptismal faith as we are kept in communion with those past, those present, and those yet to come.

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven, he is seated at the right hand of the Father, and he will come to judge the living and the dead.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic* Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, + and the life everlasting. Amen.

We Remember & Give Thanks

Chapel of the Saints Columbarium

In 2012 we dedicated the south transept of our nave into the Chapel of the Saints. As part of this transformation, we added the columbarium -- a place to inter cremated remains. The columbarium consists of separate niches that can hold up to two urns each. Names are engraved on the stone tile in front of the niche. This option for interment is available to all FELC members and family. For more information, contact Fred "Fritz" Woody or David Neuse (leader of the Columbarium Committee) or the church office. When we gather in the Chapel of the Saints, we gather as the saints of God in prayer, worship, and community. We gather with the saints of the past that we remember in various ways: the names engraved on the columbarium, the Cloud of Witnesses mobile hanging in the Chapel containing the names of all who have died at FELC since 1936, and the icons displayed on the walls that remind us of people who inspire our faith and action today.

Icons of the Saints

Our Chapel of the Saints includes icons of saints by artist Kelly Latimore. Using FELC memorial funds, we purchased and installed sixteen icons of diverse saints, ancient and contemporary, in the chapel and eight more are installed in the hallway outside the north transept entrance. There are more icons and images from the life of Christ in the artist's series. They include saints contemporary and ancient from various heritages. Additional icons are displayed in the parlor and rotated through the Chapel of the Saints. If you're interested in donating one, please contact the Cantor.
